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The vast majority of Muslim scholars, throughout history, have unanimously agreed on the obligation of implementing the Sunnah. Imam Malik, the founder of the Maliki school of jurisprudence, famously declared: "Whatever the Messenger of Allah (peace be upon him) has commanded us to do, we do it, and whatever he has forbidden us from doing, we refrain from it."

Similarly, Imam Shafi'i, the founder of the Shafi'i school of jurisprudence, asserted: "The Sunnah is a source of knowledge, and it is obligatory to follow it."

of the believers - We will give him what he has taken and drive him into Hell, and evil it is as a destination." (25:39)

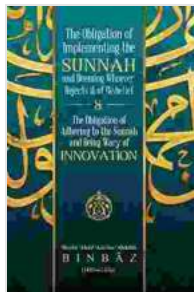

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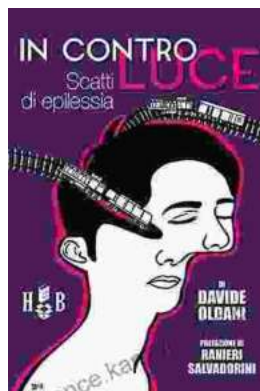
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
